

### SB 25-116: SPOUSAL MAINTENANCE GUIDELINES

## **Summary Information**

**Overview.** The bill extends the disclosure period for protection orders in dissolution of marriage and legal separation cases from two to five years, and requires courts to consider the orders in marital property division, spousal maintenance, and attorney fees decisions.

**Types of impacts.** The bill is projected to affect the following areas on an ongoing basis:

# **Summary of Legislation**

Current law requires individuals filing for dissolution of marriage or legal separation to disclose to courts any restraining orders and protection orders entered within the past two years. The bill requires the disclosure of any orders within five years of filing the petition.

If a mandatory protection order was entered against a party within five years of filing the petition, the bill:

- requires the court to consider the order when dividing marital property;
- prohibits the court from awarding spousal maintenance to the restrained party;
- allows the court to order the restrained party to pay for the other individual's attorney fees;
   and
- allows the non-restrained party to request the date of legal separation to be the date the mandatory protection order was issued.

## **State Expenditures**

Workload will minimally increase for the Judicial Department to review additional protection orders from the extended timeframe in dissolution of marriage and legal separation cases. This includes additional time for judicial officers to review the additional protection orders when making determinations on marital property, spousal maintenance, and attorney fees. As courts currently review protection orders, any increase in workload is expected to be minimal and can be absorbed within existing resources.

#### **Effective Date**

The bill takes effect 90 days following adjournment of the General Assembly sine die, assuming no referendum petition is filed.
